Camp Profile

The Academic Fun & Fitness Camp serves the unique needs of children with learning differences: ADHD, learning disabilities, Asperger's, PDD, dyslexia, or those who struggle in school. Academic and recreational activities build skills and confidence. Instructors are assigned to maintain 4:1 camper to staff ratio.

Group I	Ages 6 -8 years
Group II	Ages 9 -12 years
Group III	Ages 13 -18 years

Teen Leadership Program: Group III teens are provided with quality academics in conjunction with leadership, life, and social skills programming among age-appropriate peers. An additional goal for older campers is to provide a fun, stimulating, and safe environment to expand minds, physical ability, creativity and independence. "Teen Leaders" have opportunities to lead young campers.

Instruction and Assessment

Our professional staff is trained and understands the needs of children with learning differences. Staff members provide individual attention and support in a nurturing and structured environment. During the first week of camp, each child is interviewed and evaluated to determine academic needs. Parents receive a summary of the interview and test results as well as a progress report at the end of the camp.

Camp Registration and Fees

To determine that this camp meets the needs of each camper, potential campers are individually screened by the camp director by reviewing current IEP, MFE, and school reports and interviews or observations. Full payment is due by April 27th. A limited number of partial scholarships are available. Families may use funds from the Autism Scholarship Program, local school district, MRDD, and other sources.

Morning Session

RICHARDS READ Systematic Language : This multi-sensory, phonics-based approach to language arts helps children who struggle with word attack, comprehension, writing and spelling skills.

Real Life Math Based on age level and needs, math topics may include addition, subtraction, place value, multiplication, division, fractions, decimals, percentages, and problem-solving strategies.

Afternoon Session

Theme weeks of mini courses provide opportunities for creativity and exploration while developing social skills and self confidence.

Theater Arts: Campers help write, direct and act in an original play. Parents receive a video copy of the production on parents day.

Worlds of Science: "Future scientists" work with a variety of science demonstrations exploring subjects like nature, flight, and rockets.

Poetry and Computers: Working with a poetry therapist, campers become poets and editors using desktop publishing.

Visual Arts: Campers explore a variety of methods to create art, assisted by an art therapist.

Sports: Experienced coaches give pointers and guide campers for non-competitive fun.

Martial Arts: Weekly class.

Puppeteering: Campers make puppets and learn puppeteering.
